### **IN MEMORIAM**



Roderick Allen Bennett, 'Rod', born on July 23, 1940, was raised on an 80 acre farm between Davis and Durand, IL. The farm had no electrical services or running water until he went off to Blake School, one of the county's last one room school houses. As a very young child he built replica barns and corrals which his mother saved for years. In Durand High School's 1958 annual Rod said his life's ambition was to be a building con-

tractor.

From humble beginnings, this born carpenter built one of Northern Illinois' most respected commercial/industrial union construction companies, Bennett Construction, Inc., Pecatonica, IL. This was a work of love for Rod, and he was successful due to his single minded determination and plain old hard work. He was blessed with dedicated employees who were his second family. Rod worked every day of his life, and even on his death bed wanted to make sure proposals were submitted and contracts signed.

Rod died on August 19, 2022 of complications from cancer treatment. His family surrounded him and supported him as he drew his final breaths.

Rod loved fast cars, fast boats, heavy equipment, and ice cream. He was a dedicated member of the Northern Illinois Corvette Club. For more than two decades he led the Club in the annual Pecatonica Memorial Day Parade. He also was a member of the Pecatonica Old Car Club. He was an avid euchre player. For many years you could find him grabbing breakfast and a game as early as 5:00am. He loved teasing friends and chasing after anything with a siren and flashing lights along with his breakfast buddies from the 'farmer's table.'

He was a man of quiet generosity, supporting local community groups, sports teams, the Winnebago County Fair, Ducks Unlimited, The Carrie Lynn Children's Center, and the Unitarian Universalist Church of Rockford both financially and with donations of expertise, labor, and equipment for construction related projects.



### Remembering The Lotus-Developed LT5 V8 In The C4 Corvette ZR-1

Chevy's recent reveal of the all-new flat-plane crank 5.5L V8 LT6 engine in the 2023 Corvette Z06 probably got many of us thinking about Corvette engines of the past. Today, let's take a look at the Lotus-developed 5.7L V8 LT5 that powered the C4 Corvette ZR-1 (not to be confused with the supercharged LT5 in the C7 Corvette ZR1).





Yeah, we hear you. Regarding the LT5, it's confusing to have the same engine code applied to two different powerplants, but at least they both powered ZR1 Corvettes.

Yet, the Lotus-designed LT5 actually has some general similarities to the new flat-plane crank LT6. The LT5 in the C4 Corvette ZR1 was a naturally aspirated, all-aluminum, 32-valve, DOHC small block V8, much like the LT6 in

the 2023 Corvette C8 Z06. But it didn't have a flat-plane crank, and is not a Chevy Small Block V8 even though both engines share the Small Block's signature 4.4-inch bore spacing.

For the 1990 model year, Chevy launched the "King of the Hill" C4 Corvette ZR-1 with the LT5. Output of the LT5 was impressive at that time, producing 375 horse-power and 370 pound-feet of torque. Lotus designed a unique air management system to provide a wider power band by shutting off eight of the 16 intake runners and fuel injectors when the engine was at part-throttle, while still giving the C4 Corvette ZR1 those 375 horses when at wide open throttle.



In 1993, GM increased LT5 output by 30 horses and 15 pound-feet of torque (to 405 and 385, respectively) thanks to four-bolt main caps, improved cylinder heads, new pistons, revised cam timing, and new exhaust manifolds. Many of those innovations are common now, but they were revolutionary in the 1990s.



Perhaps the most exotic and radical engine to sit in a Corvette until the LT6 in the C8 Z06, the LT5 in the C4 Corvette ZR-1 was engineered by GM and Lotus, then machined and assembled by Mercury Marine's MerCruiser division in Stillwater, Oklahoma. The GM-Lotus tie-up came about in 1986, when General Motors had acquired Group Lotus, a UK-based engineering consultant and performance car manufacturing firm. The Corvette team wanted to build the world's fastest production car based on the C4 Corvette and approached Lotus

with the idea. Hence, the LT5 was born, replacing the L98, which had the same bore centers.

In addition to the LT5 engine, Lotus helped GM design the upgraded braking and steering system in the C4 Corvette ZR-1. The range-topping Vette was also shod with custom-made Goodyear Eagle Gatorback tires, sized P315/35ZR-17. Due to the heavier engine and body along with wider tires, the C4 Corvette ZR1 was 200 pounds heavier than the standard C4 Corvette.

To manage the increased weight, the FX3 suspension system was engineered by Bilstein and was similar to the system used in the Porsche 959, but with modifications from the Lotus Formula 1 division. It incorporated a gas-over-oil shock absorber with a hollow center shaft that was fitted with an adjustable orifice to controls the flow of oil. The setup allowed for six damping settings in each of the

three driving modes, namely Touring, Sport, and Performance, and had 14 total steps. Servomotors coupled with a microprocessor governed the vehicle's speed and adjusted the suspension system accordingly.

Thanks to the engineering marvel that was the LT5, the C4 Corvette ZR-1 was incredibly quick for its time, hitting 0-60 mph in just 4.4 seconds and the quarter-mile in just 12.7 seconds, on to a top speed of over 180 mph. It was so quick that it set seven international and world records at a test track in Fort Stockton, Texas, on March 1st, 1990.

### 8 Reasons Why Every Gearhead Should Drive A Chevy Corvette C6

The Chevrolet Corvette, America's sports car since 1953, there's been eight editions of it since its inception; each bringing something different to the table. Each generation has been a perfect encapsulation of the era into which it was released, a time capsule of the period.

But, putting the themes of each era aside, the Corvette has always stood for as a light, lithe and crude salute to Europeans. It takes an unashamedly American approach in everything it does and still manages to hang with the best sports and even supercars that the rest of the world has to offer.

### 8 It's An American Icon

Some cars make "why you must drive" lists all the time, and for good reasons. There's typically one genera-

tion of the Corvette that always makes these lists, depending on the author's choice. They were the car of choice for a dollar for astronauts. Prince sang about them. It was the pace car at the 2006 Indy 500 and Daytona 500.

If you want to experience the true essence of Americana, a Corvette is definitely a good way to go. Outside of the US, when you ask someone to think of an American car, there are few names that always make the list, the Mustang undoubtedly makes it, but it's usually followed by the Corvette. It's cemented

in the public mindset as an aspirational slice of the Great US of A.

### 7 Racing has Enhanced the Breed

Since its inception, the Corvette has been just as at home on twisting road courses as it has on the road itself. Years of motorsport honing have seen the Corvette go from strength to strength. In 2005, they outlasted the Brits and their Aston MartinDBRs at LeMans and came home 1-2 in class.







Domination was the name of the game for the C6.R on the racetrack, and it echoes through into the road cars. Both on home soil and in Europe, the brash boy from Kentucky stood toe-to-toe with some of the greats of GT and endurance racing and proved that it could roll with the punches. And that trickled down to the road-going versions.



### 6 It Can Hold A Candle To Some Of The Biggest And Best

When taken to the limit around the Nordschleife, the C6 Corvette set a very admirable lap time of 7:19.63. In

comparison, eight years after that lap time was set, Jaguar, in a fully prepped XE SV Project 8 could only make it around in 7:23.164. That's the twoseat, track-package, race-ready monster still a few seconds shy of America's iconic sports car.

On a smaller scale, when pushed to the limit by

the Stig, a ZR1 C6 was able to outpace a Ferrari 599 GTB and a 911 GT3 RS, a certified track monster befitted with a roll cage and wings for days. Even Ford's GT from 2005 couldn't get close to the 'Vette. And the icing on the cake? The Corvette set its lap time in the damp. In the dry, it could have been getting close to hypercar royalty, such as Porsche's Carrera GT.



### 5 The LS7

If you get a chance to get behind the wheel of a C6, you might be fortunate enough to find it is a Z06 spec



model. Upfront you'll find a hand built, dry sumped, LS7 V8 engine. Packed with smart engineering, including titanium alloy connecting rods, the LS7 in the C6 produced a very hearty 505 hp and a stonking 470 lb-ft of torque. Some crazy science around the LS7 is that it features hypereutectic pistons.

This means that the aluminium used to cast them has been alloyed with over 12% by weight Silicon. The result of this is an alloy that is super stable under high temperatures and more resistant to expansion when it gets hot. This allowed the LS7 engineers to run much tighter tolerances in the engine, produc-

ing a healthier, more efficient engine, the final result, more power and a wicked high redline of 7,000 rpm. Although if you're clever enough, you can take the mighty LS7 round to 11,000 rpm.

### 4 The Hi-Tech Materials

When you're looking to produce a highly competitive sports car, you cannot just cobble it together from assorted odds and ends of pig iron and duct tape. Corvettes have long been known for their fiberglass bodywork, keeping the weight down. But the floor pan on the C6 is unique in its composition, made from balsa wood and carbon fiber.

The engine cradle is a magnesium alloy and the whole frame is aluminum, as opposed to the standard steel model, saving 136lbs on the frame alone! Go even higher up the spec tree with the ZR1, and the car is littered with carbon fiber and polycarbonates. The brakes are another example of top-notch materials, here being carbon ceramics.

### 3 This Was The First Corvette With Fixed Headlamps Since The C1

A bit of history, and yeah, the C2, C3, C4 and C5 all had pop-up lamps, but with evolving pedestrian safety rules coming in, the characterful pop-ups had to die. So it was back to fixed units, as we'd



seen in the C1.

Not really a big entry, but we love the color coded lining to the headlights on the C6 and think it really helps blend the transition from the pop-ups on previous gens.

### 2 It Has An Oft-Forgotten Sibling

Raise your hand if you can remember the Cadillac XLR. Hmmm, thought so. That's not many of you. The Caddy XLR was a grand tourer built by GM's luxury arm on the C6 platform, the Y platform.

The Cadillac didn't get the same powertrain options that the C6s got, instead having to make do with the Northstar V8. An engine with a terrible track record. Sales were slim, no one wanted a slower Corvette with a terrible face and after five years and just 15,460 produced over that time, compared to its 5

-7,000 per year projections, the XLR was axed. Let's face it, if you wanted a big, muscly drop-top cruiser, at that price point you were buying a Mercedes SL.

### 1 The Name Is Cool

Corvette isn't some imagined name from a marketing meeting like Camaro, it stems back to French; a nod



perhaps to its European ambition. Work backwards enough, and you'll find Corvette translates to "basket". Which isn't necessarily cool, but that name had a cooler purpose later, becoming a lightly armed fast ship under the age of sail, a light frigate essentially. When you think of some of the most evocative names from the automotive world, Corvette certainly falls into the same camp as Mustang, Charger, Challenger, and Camaro. It's certainly not a Sunny or a Gloria. More so, it could be shortened to a cool nickname of sorts, 'Vette.

So if you're looking for a car with heritage, speed, precision, style and substance, look no further than the C6 Corvette. Overlook this generation of Corvette at your peril. It represents a high-water mark for GM, and short of making the C8 mid-engined, they haven't been able to eclipse the C6. That's not to say that newer generations are worse, but they haven't moved the yardstick on in the same way that the C6 did.

I know I have caught my share of the insects over my childhood (okay, maybe even some while an adult but only for my young children you understand). In my trips to the western states I did not think fireflies existed. They do, but they do not light up. A firefly that does not light up seems like an oxymoron to me. There are 20 species of lightning bugs found in Illinois. There are 56 varieties here in Florida. But do you think one could find there way around



my house? Not one puts on a light show for us. Bummer! I hope you enjoy the firefly facts below. Learn the scientific names below and impress your friends at your next cocktail party.

### Why Do Fireflies Glow And Other Illuminating Facts

Many backyards are already aglow with magical fireflies—or lightning bugs as many people call them. On warm evenings, there's nothing better than sitting and watching them light up the night. Here are a few fascinating facts about fireflies you may not know.



### **10 Fascinating Facts About Fireflies**

1. It turns out that it's not just the adult firefly that lights up. Among some species, the eggs glow, and the eggs of certain species will flash if you tap them gently. Most larva – often called glowworms – are also capable of producing light.

2. They're energy efficient. No man-made light source can claim to be entirely energy efficient, but a firefly's glowing tail uses 100% of the energy it produces to emit light. By comparison, the average incandescent lightbulb releases 90% of its energy as heat and 10% as light, while fluorescent bulbs release 30% as heat and 70% as light.

3. The flashing is more than just a pretty light show. Among the species of fireflies that produce a glow, each one has its own unique flash pattern, and they use the flashes to attract mates. Females wait in tall foliage, flashing to attract males. The males flash in response as they move closer to the females. The glow is also a handy way to repel predators. Since fireflies produce bitter chemicals as a response to predators, most insect-eating animals know that if it lights up, it tastes bad.

4. It's easy to identify fireflies by their flash patterns. Photinus pyralis is one of the more common types found in the United States, and this species always makes a J-shaped flash by lighting up as they fly in an arc. Photinus brimley flies in a straight line and produces one flash every three to eight seconds. Photinus consimilis makes a double flash every five seconds, and Photinus collustrans flashes three times in two to three seconds.

5. Some fireflies are tricksters. While adults of most species eat pollen or smaller insects, some females of the Photuris genus prey on male lightning bugs of other species. They'll lure the males in by mimicking their flash patterns. And, since female Photuris fireflies gravitate towards the flash patterns of different species, male Photuris fireflies mimic those species to attract the females.

6. Not all fireflies make yellow or green light. Pyractomena lightning bugs, for instance, create orange light. In the southern United States, you may chance across Phausis reticulata, or the Blue Ghost lightning bug. Blue Ghosts don't flash at all, instead, they produce a soft but steady blue glow. Others, particularly those that live in the western United States, don't light up at all. Continued from Page 24 Why Do Fireflies Glow And Other Illuminating Facts

7. Some fireflies can actually synchronize their flashes. In the United States, there is only one synchronous species – Photinus carolinus—and there are only a few spots to watch as they put on one of nature's greatest light shows. You can catch a glimpse in the Allegheny National Forest in Pennsylvania or the Congaree National Park in South Carolina. The best place to watch, however, is the Great Smoky Mountains National Park in Tennessee. People flock to this park every May and June to watch as thousands of lightning bugs produce perfectly timed flashes.



Lightning bugs glow because their tails contain just the right chemicals and enzymes (calcium, adenosine triphosphate, luciferin, and luciferase) to create a bioluminescent chemical reaction. These insects control the flashing by adding oxygen to start the chemical reaction within the light-producing organ in their tails.
 They help save lives. Researchers have discovered that the luciferase produced by fireflies is useful for anything from detecting blood clots to tracking the efficacy of cancer medications. In fact, scientists have learned how to make synthetic luciferase, which means that the medical industry no longer needs to harvest this bioluminescent chemical from them.

10. They have surprisingly short life spans – only one season. They spend most of their adult lives searching for a mate. Once mated, the females lay their eggs and die shortly thereafter. New crops hatch the following spring and the cycle starts over!



### NICC Vette Visions


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
