#### Just The Facts!

The first ball drops were designed for ship captains, not New Year's Eve.

Whether at home on the couch or among the crowds in Times Square, watching the New Year's Eve ball drop symbolizes a fresh start. But as the ball descends to mark another year gone by, it also harkens back to an era when knowing the exact time was much more difficult. Before the 20th century, timekeeping was significantly less precise; most people noted the time thanks to church bells that rang on the hour, though the system was often inaccurate. For sailors and ship captains, knowing the exact time was key for charting navigational courses, and they used a device called a chronometer to keep track of time onboard ships. That's why Robert Wauchope, a captain in the



British Navy, created the time ball in 1829. The raised balls were visible to ships along the British coastline, and they were manually dropped at the same time each day, allowing ships to set their chronometers to the time at their port of departure. At sea, navigators would calculate longitude based on local time, which they could determine from the angle of the sun, and the time on their chronometer.

# Corvettes, Cuisine, & Cocktails The Ding-A-Ling Supper Club

Unassuming is the word that best describes The Ding-A-Ling Supper Club in Hanover, Wisconsin. On first pass, you might not even realize it's a restaurant, but the full parking lot and the first few steps in the door will clear that right up.

You'll likely get a "holler" from someone behind the bar welcoming you and asking if you've got reservations, and you totally

should, as wait times can be lengthy on busy evenings. The 'Ding" as locals call it isn't large, and it's not fancy, but they have a knack for getting people in and out in an efficient manner. The bar and waitstaff are outstanding, and often stop to quickly chat and build relationships with those who visit – one of the unique things that make this supper club a spot people travel lengthy distances to visit.

It's well worth your time to arrive early enough to hop up to the bar and order a beverage. The Old Fashioned is a staple, and Kyla the owner will tell you "they mix em stiff" when you place your order for a mixed drink of any kind. But the locals generally have a beer in hand and if you follow their lead, it will likely be a Spotted Cow or a PBR.

While this is indeed a supper club, don't think it's necessary to dress up for this dinner. You'll find a range of anything from baseball caps to those fancy "supper clubbers" who visit in their fedoras. And everyone is welcomed and appreciated.

Once you've got a beverage in hand and your name is on the list for a table, you should definitely make conversation with those around you. You may be surprised how far people have traveled to visit, and the culture of the establishment encourages conversation, laughter, and treating everyone as your new best friend.

Once you score a table, it's time to make the most difficult decision of the night. Known for their steaks, the most expensive one on the menu, a 16 oz. filet mignon, comes in at just \$31.99, but you'll find a variety of steaks for every appetite and budget. Add to that their famous prime rib which comes in 3 different sizes with the most expensive option a 16 oz. king at \$26.99.



Steak not your thing? Their Friday night fish fry draws crowds from all over the Stateline and beyond on Friday nights. They also have a full seafood menu as well as chicken options, ribs, burgers, salads, and much more. And DO NOT miss the chance to start off the meal with a "Hanover Haystack", an onion ring plate that feeds the whole table with leftovers. But this is just one of their delicious appetizer options.

As is typical of Wisconsin supper clubs, you'll want to finish off your dinner with an after-dinner beverage. The Ding-A-Ling is well known for their frozen dessert drinks, but they also offer a variety of "amped up" coffee cocktails as well.

Be sure to check out the list of specials, as those draw in the crowds as well Tuesday through Sunday.

The Ding-A-Ling is definitely off the beaten path, which is always a great way to take that corvette out for a cruise. There are a variety of backroads options to reach this little gem, so it might even be fun to take one route on the way there, and choose a different route home.


## "Every Picture Tells a Story"



# Corvette Trivia (Part I)

A limited production run of 300 Corvettes began in June 1953, after its successful debut as a concept vehicle at GM Motorama in New York City in January.

The Corvette has been built in three different places: Flint, Michigan; St. Louis, Missouri; and Bowling Green, Kentucky.

The first design team was led by Harley Earl. After WWII, he thought the US needed its own sports car and convinced GM to develop one.

The Z06 nameplate was originally an alpha-numeric order option code. The Z signified special packages and performance packages.

The 1965 Corvette was the first model year to offer a big block engine; the mighty 396-cubic-inch Turbo Jet V8.

Red is by far the most popular color in Corvette history, with totals approaching a quarter-million.

The first Corvette was offered in just a single color, in fact: Polo White with a red interior.

The 1968 model year saw a complete body redesign, and the removable T-tops and removable back window

#### When is a Corvette a Sting Ray and not a Stingray?

Quick—is the 1968 Corvette above a Sting Ray or a Stingray? If you're a Corvette enthusiast, you probably know the difference, right? Plenty of Vette fans, even those that aren't owners, will be quick to correct you if you happen to use the incorrect phrase while debating the finer points of America's Sports Car. May Zora Arkus-Duntov help you if you make that mistake on the wrong forum.

The "Sting Ray" moniker, two words, was first used on a production Corvette in 1963 for the second-generation cars, which featured a major front-end restyling compared to the first, along with a major chassis redesign and an independent rear suspension. 1963 also marked the first time a hardtop coupe was available in the Corvette lineup. The aquatic name had been previously applied to the XP-87 development car, which was dubbed the Stingray Racer. Its design would influence the XP-755 Mako Shark concept and, eventually, the production 1963 Sting Ray.

The third-generation Corvette debuted in 1968, with lines that evolved from the Mako Shark II concept from 1965 and Pontiac's XP-833 from 1966. When the 1969 Corvette rolled out, it wore a few structural changes and only a few minor functional updates, including a new door-handle mechanism. It also wore script "Stingray" emblems on each fender—this time, one word. A Stingray badge would remain on Corvettes through 1976. In 1977, the Stingray name was gone, both from the car and from brochures, not to return until the seventh-generation Corvette in 2014.

The fact that Corvette wasn't labeled with Stingray in 1968 has led many Vette fans to assume that '68 mod-

els aren't Stingrays, and they're right. However, they are Sting Rays, as 1968 sales brochures show. Photo captions call the '68 Corvette a "Sting Ray" just like the earlier second-gen cars, as does the body text. Of course, this muddies the waters a bit, as many fans accept Sting Ray as referring to second-generation Corvettes, but car nomenclature is full of one-year-only oddities and trivia like this. If these sorts of idiosyncrasies didn't exist, we'd have to find other very important things to argue about, like which cars count as muscle cars or why Pontiac Trans Ams are cooler than Camaros.

#### 4 Fast Chevrolet Corvette Models That Won't Break the Bank

Unlike the new Chevrolet Corvette Z06, older performance-oriented trims can tick your fast Corvette boxes while also operating within your budget.

The Chevrolet Corvette has been "America's sports car" for over 70 years. In that time, base model 'Vettes captured enthusiasts' attention and affection. However, some razor-sharp, performance-oriented trims took the "Plastic Fantastic" to the next level. Check out some of the best options for a fast Chevrolet Corvette that might not bust your budget, like the C5 Z06, C6 Z06, and C7 Corvette Stingray.

#### How much is a C4 Corvette ZR-1?

Depending on the mileage and model year, the C4 Chevrolet Corvette ZR-1 is still a performance bargain, despite its rising popularity. A 1995 ZR-1 has a typical listing price of around \$49,488. However, eager fans can find earlier models for closer to \$25,000.

Moreover, with as much as 405 horsepower, the ZR-1's all-aluminum V8 powerplant matched the later C5 Corvette Z06. Better yet, the Car and Driver says a

1990 model could dispose of a sprint to 60 mph in just 4.5 seconds, 0.1 seconds faster than a Ferrari F355 Berlinetta.

#### Is a C5 Z06 fast?

The Chevrolet Corvette Z06 from the C5 generation is the first production wedge 'Vette to break the 4.0-second mark to 60 mph. Specifically, the later 2002 to 2004 C5 Z06 models had the potential to hit 60 in 3.9 seconds on their way to a 12.4-second quarter mile.

The C5 Z06's savage speed is a 405-horsepower aluminum 5.7L V8 mill with a launch-happy 400 lb-ft of torque. Better yet, with a fair purchase price of \$23,456, the C5 Z06 is one of the best performance bargains on the market, regardless of make and model.

#### How much HP does a C6 Z06 have?

The Chevrolet Corvette C6 Z06 produces 505 horsepower and 470 lb-ft of torque from the largest-displacement motor in the namesake's history: a tireroasting 7.0L V8. The result of that monstrous, naturally aspirated mill? A sixthgeneration Corvette Z06 will hit 60 min just 3.6 seconds.

Moreover, a 2008 C6 Z06 has a fair value of around \$39,047 for a model with average mileage. Like the C5 version, the C6 Z06 is one of the most capable used performance cars at its price point. For instance, the 2023 BMW M240i

xDrive, a new car with the same 0 to 60 mph time, starts at around \$48,895. Moreover, the C6 Z06 offers a manual transmission, a feature that modern performance cars like the M240i go without.

#### How much is a C7 Corvette Stingray?

While a used, base-model Chevrolet Corvette C7 Stingray isn't at Toyota GR86 levels of affordability, it's still a top performer at its price point. According to Kelley Blue Book (KBB), a 2014 Chevrolet Corvette Stingray has a fair value of \$39,720.

Moreover, the C7 Stingray Z51 is the first base model Corvette to hit 60 mph in under 4.0 seconds. Specifically, a C7 with the Z51 package has the potential to hit 60 mph in around 3.8 seconds, granted the driver doesn't immolate the rear tires. While the supercharged C7 Z06 and ultra-rare ZR1 are still pricey, the C7 Stingray offers world-class performance at a reasonable sports car price point.

#### **Z06**, E-Ray, Or Stingray: Which Is The Best C8 Chevrolet Corvette?

We compare the current line-up of the C8 Corvette to see which trim makes the most sense to buy and for whom.

The C8 Corvette is a firecracker. With a mid-engined layout, it stands as a tougher rival to its European counterparts - packing similar performance levels for nearly half the price. And with this eight-gen iteration, Chevrolet has made sure that there is a Corvette according to everyone's budget and liking.

The range starts with the Stingray, which gets a 490 hp naturally aspirated V8 and rear-wheel drive. Then you have the E-Ray, which, in a first for the Corvette, gets electrical assistance and all-wheel drive with a combined system output of 655 hp.

The hottest version of the C8 Corvette is the Z06. Besides a 670 hp flat plane crank V8, it gets a bunch of gofast upgrades, which massively boosts its on-street and on-track performance.

But which one of these is the best? Is it the base Stingray, the hybrid E-Ray, or the howling Z06? Let's compare and find out.

The Stingray gets a 6.2-liter naturally aspirated pushrod V8. The engine cranks out 490 hp and 370 lb-ft of torque. An eight-speed dual-clutch automatic is standard, sending power to the rear wheels. Chevrolet offers an optional Z51 performance package for the Stingray, which increases the 6.2-liter LT2's power output to 495 hp.

It also unlocks a handful of other upgrades, such as a limited-slip rear differential, more powerful brakes, aggressive tires, revised suspension tuning, better cooling, and additional aero. The result is an entry-level Stingray with supercar performance levels - reaching 60 mph in 2.8 seconds and crossing the quarter mile in 11.1 seconds.

The E-Ray also gets the same 6.2-liter LT2 V8 as the Stingray, with the power output dialed up to the full 495 hp. The gas-powered motor drives the rear wheels through an eight-speed auto. But unlike the Stingray, a 160 hp electric motor is also part of the setup. It drives the front axle, making the C8 E-Ray the first all-wheel drive corvette.



The electrical assistance gives the Corvette E-Ray a total system output of 655 hp. 470 lb- Image Credit: Chevrolet ft of torque is sent to the rear wheels by the gas-powered V8, while 125 lb-ft goes to the front axle by the electric motor. At 2.5 seconds, the E-Ray is quicker to 60 MPH than the Stingray.

The Z06 sits at the top of the C8's line-up. It gets a new 5.5-liter V8 with a flat-plane crank. Apart from 670 hp and 460 lb-ft of torque, this engine produces a wild howling sound that'll even turn the heads of the most loyal Ferrari fans.

0 to 60 MPH comes in 2.6 seconds in the Z06, faster than the Stingray but 0.1 seconds slower than the E-Ray. Power goes to the rear wheels through an eight-speed automatic. You can make the Z06 even more trackfocused by adding the Z07 package, which unlocks more aggressive aero, stickier Michelin rubber, and stronger brakes.

#### The E-Ray Will Promise The Best MPGs Across C8 Corvette's Line-Up

As you'd expect, the fuel economy for the V8-powered C8's line-up isn't impressive. EPA rates the Stingray for 16 MPG in the city, 24 MPG on the highway, and 19 MPG combined. The Z06 performs worse in this area, with a rating of 12 MPG in the city, 21 MPG on the highway, and 15 MPG combined.

Though EPA hasn't released the official fuel-economy ratings for the 2024 Corvette E-Ray, they are likely to be the highest among all the trims. This hybrid Vette gets a 1.1 kWh battery pack, which allows for electric-only driving for short distances at speeds lower than 45 mph, which should also help boost its EPA rating.

### The Stingray Is The Most Affordable C8 Corvette **2024 Chevrolet Corvette: Price**

Prices for the Corvette Stingray kick off at \$67,895 for the entry-level 1LT coupe and \$74,895 for the 1LT convertible. They stretch to \$79,645 for the top-spec 3LT coupe and \$86,645 for the 3LT convertible - making Stingray the most affordable in C8's line-up.

The E-Ray coupe is available for \$104,495, while you'll have to dish out \$111,295 for its convertible version.

The Z06 is the most expensive Corvette, starting at \$112,295 for the 1LZ coupe and \$119,295 for the 1LZ convertible. These top off at \$125,845 for the 3LZ coupe and \$132,845 for the 3LZ convertible.

These prices are still a long way off from the current-gen Corvette's competitors, such as the Ferrari 296 GTB (\$343,000) and the McLaren Artura (\$238,000).

#### Which C8 Chevrolet Corvette Should You Buy?

Between the Stingray, E-Ray, and the Z06, which trim of the C8 should you pick? Jason from the Front Seat Driver YouTube channel might have a solution we'd all agree on. In his latest video, he talks about the big differences between the current C8's line-up from behind the wheel of his friend Justin's Z06.

While the Z06 is the wildest Corvette currently on sale, the E-Ray and the Stingray each have their own merits. As Justin explains in the video, the Z06 is for someone who drives the Corvette occasionally and drives it hard. It packs in insane levels of performance, which the base Stingray doesn't provide.

While the E-Ray has similar levels of grunt, it lacks the drama that the flat plane crank V8 of the Z06 comes with. But as Jason points out in the video, the E-Ray is the most sensible pick for someone who would use their C8 as a daily driver. It offers the right balance between outright performance and sensible MPGs.

The Corvette Stingray is ideal for those who want a sub-\$100,000 sports car. With the Z51 package, it offers supercar levels of performance at a fraction of the cost.

#### **Upcoming 2025 Corvette ZR1 Will Be The Ultimate Z06**

Chevrolet is planning to crank up the performance of the C8 Corvette all the way to eleven with the 2025 ZR1. It will be the ultimate version of the Z06, featuring the same 5.5-liter flat-plane crank V8 engine but strapped on with two turbochargers.

Power is expected to touch 800 hp, cutting down on Z06's current sprint to 60 mph. Besides featuring forced induction, the ZR1 will also bring a bunch of oth-

er high-performance upgrades to the C8 Corvette. These would include an aggressive aero package, suspension upgrades, better brakes, and tires.

Chevrolet will price the ZR1 higher than the current C8's line-up. Expect its MSRP to touch the \$150,000 mark.

#### A Chevrolet Corvette SUV Is Also In The Works

As strange as it may sound (or not), a Corvette SUV is on the horizon. Details are scarce, but it is safe to assume that it'll pack in enough performance to take on its European rivals, such as the Ferrari Purosangue, Lamborghini Urus, and the Porsche Cayenne GTS.

Entry-level versions could feature the Stingray's 6.2-litre V8. But the most aggressive trim will likely get the 5.5-litre V8 out of the Z06. Chevy could introduce a Corvette SUV E-Ray with the same gas engine and electric motor configuration as the sports car.

## Corvette Trivia (Part II)

The split window was offered only in 1963 and was scrapped for subsequent years after Zora Arkus-Duntov argued that the split interfered with the driver's rear visibility.

The code name for development of the first Corvette was called Project Opel. Code name Project Gemini was used by the team that developed the groundbreaking LT6 engine for the 2023 Corvette Z06.

In 1962, a 4-passenger prototype was built in response to Ford's 4-passenger Thunderbird, but it was never produced.

Corvette is the longest continuously produced passenger car name plate in the world. The longest-running vehicle of any type is the Chevrolet Suburban.

Bob Grossman and John Fitch raced the #3 C1 Corvette for the first time at Le Mans in 1960, winning the GT 5.0-liter class and coming in 8th overall.

Alan Shepard arrived at space training in 1959 in the 1957 Corvette he owned at the time. All of the Mercury 7 astronauts later received Corvettes through a local Florida dealer.

In 1956, five Corvettes made up the factory racing program that debuted at the 12 Hours of Sebring.

Corvette has paced the Indy 500 more than any other single nameplate. Corvette has paced the Indy 500 a record 19 times, most recently in 2022.

The C3 generation ended with the model year 1982, and C4 started with model year 1984, skipping 1983.

Betty Skelton held several land speed records, but in 1956, she hit a record 145.044 mph in her Corvette on the Daytona Beach sand flats thus setting a women's land speed record.

The XP-882 concept was shown at the 1970 New York Auto Show. It was powered by a transverse-mounted V8 engine located behind the cockpit.

And just like the four travelers on that train arriving in Vermont, Illinois is pretty much snowless this winter. But it will snow and then you will be wishing that you were in Florida or some other warm climate. There are people who like snow, and maybe it's you. There is no doubt that snow is fascinating and provides a beautiful landscape. But how much do you know about the frozen rain that flutters down from the

sky? Well there are many mistaken thoughts about snow and the article below sets the record straight.

#### **Snow Myths And Odd Facts**

Ever wonder if it's true that no two snowflakes are alike? How about if large snowflakes mean the storm won't last long? Learn the truth about popular myths and bizarre facts that you'll want to tell a friend about. After reading this, you may find yourself building an igloo!



#### **Snow Myths Explained**

Contrary to popular belief, two snowflakes can be alike!

In 1988 a scientist at the National Center for Atmosphere Research found two identical crystals during a storm in Wisconsin. However these snowflakes were only a few molecules wide.

The myth still holds up when it comes to larger snowflakes—ones that you would see drifting in the air. No two complex snowflakes are alike.

#### Do large snowflakes mean it's only a passing flurry?

Possibly, but not necessarily. It means that the temperature in the upper atmosphere is warmer. If temperatures continue to rise, it could mean that the snow will stop forming.

A classic bit of weather lore states "Big Snow, Little Snow. Little Snow, Big Snow." Farmers' Almanac Editor Peter Geiger explains: "The smaller the snowflake, the colder the conditions and the more powerful the system—which leads to a large amount of accumulations. So small snowflakes mean greater accumulations. Big snowflakes have lots of moisture and either melt or cling together upon contact and do not build up during the storm. So if you see big wet snowflakes there should be less snow accumulating from this storm."

#### Snow may fall when temperatures are above the freezing.

Snow forms in the clouds where temperatures are freezing. However it can theoretically fall when the ground surface temperatures are in the mid-40s, sometimes even higher. (See below!)

#### Snow is translucent—not white.

While we may dream of a White Christmas, this isn't technically accurate. It reflects up to 90 percent of the light, with no color absorbed, therefore it is the light reflecting off the fallen snow that makes it appear to be white. Dust, pollution, and algae may make it seem to be blue, black, or even pink.

#### A yodel won't cause an avalanche.

While several things can trigger an avalanche, noise isn't one of them. Weight, such as a sudden flood of snow, sudden high wind speeds, or even the agitable footsteps of a skier can prompt a sudden cascade, but loud noises, such as yodeling, won't have much effect and are merely fictional plot devices in movies.

#### **Fun Facts**

#### There are 35 types of snowflakes.

The air temperature determines a snowflake's shape. SmithsonianMagazine.com provides a link to a great infographic that shows all the kinds here.

#### Dust or pollen is required.

Snowflakes form around tiny bits of dust or pollen in the air. According to the National Snow and Ice Data Center, snow is a mineral. It is a naturally occurring solid, formed inorganically, with a definite chemical composition.

#### Snowflakes grow on their way down.

On their decent to earth through humid air, more water vapor freezes onto the surface of the crystal, enlarging their hexagonal pattern.

#### Snowflakes travel up to 9 miles per hour.

Depending on the environmental conditions, snowflakes can fall to Earth from 1-9 mph. It takes one snow-flake roughly an hour to reach the ground.

#### Does it affect outdoor sounds?

Freshly fallen snow absorbs sounds waves, making everything sound hushed after a flurry. Once it melts and refreezes however, the ice can make the sound waves travel even further.

#### **More Bizarre Facts**

#### It can be 100 degrees warmer inside an igloo!

Snow is a great insulator. It's made of 90-95 percent trapped air which prevents the transfer of heat. Warmed entirely by body heat, an igloo can be 100 degrees warmer than the outside environment. This is why animals will dig deep holes in the snow for hibernation.



#### **Death Valley Sightings**

Death Valley has received several dustings. The most recent was in 2008.

#### **Criminalized in New York**

In a tongue-to-cheek attempt to curb the onslaught in one of America's snowiest cities, the city of Syracuse, NY, passed a decree in 1992 to outlaw snow before Christmas Eve. Unfortunately, Mother Nature doesn't adhere to our laws, and it began coming down on December 24.

#### A Clinical Fear

It's called "chionophobia" from the Greek word for snow (chioni).

#### **Hundreds of Names**

It has been said that the Inuits have roughly 50 words for snow, however that pales in the comparison to the Scots, who have a recorded 421 terms for the white stuff, including 'skovin' (a large snowflake), 'spitters' (small drops of driving snow), and 'flindrikin' (a slight shower).

#### The Golden Snow Globe Award

is a friendly national competition which awards the snowiest city, with a population of over 1,000,000. Buffalo, New York took home the trophy for the snowiest 2021-2022 season (97.4 inches).

#### **World Records**

#### World's Largest Snowflake

The largest snowflake on record measured 15 inches in diameter and 8 inches thick and fell in Fort Keogh, Montana, in 1887. Local ranchers described the flakes as "larger than milk pans."

#### **Greatest Depth Ever Recorded**

Tamarack, California holds the U.S. record for the greatest snow depth ever recorded. A total of 452 inches, or 37.5 feet, was recorded on March 11, 1911.

#### **World-record Snowfall In 60 Minutes**

Lake effect snow events help command the record books when it comes to extreme, but brief snow fall records. Copenhagen, NY, holds the record for most snowfall in one hour, recording 12 inches on December 2, 1966.

#### **Most Snowfall 24-Hours**

Silver Lake, Colorado sets the record for most snowfall in a 24-hour period. On April 14-15 in 1921, a six-foot tall man would have been buried by snow if he stood outside, recording a total of 75.8 inches of snow in one day.

#### **Most Snow Angels In One Location**

Bismark, North Dakota, holds the record for the most snow angels in one place simultaneously. 9,000 people took to the snow on the state Capital grounds, waving their arms to land the world record on February 17, 2007.



#### **Largest Snowball Fight**

On January 12, 2013, 5,834 snow fighters exchanged "snow fire" in Seattle, Washington to create the largest snowball fight in the world.

#### **Largest Igloo Ever Built**

In Zermatt, Switzerland, eighteen crew members from the Iglu-Dorf (igloo-dorf) building crew built the largest igloo ever, measuring an impressive more than 34' tall and 42' in diameter. It took three weeks to construct, using approximately 1,400 blocks of snow.

#### The Fake Stuff

How is man-made snow made? Often the man-made option is needed to keep the slopes open. The process for making man-made snow mimics the natural formation of snow, with small droplets of water freezing into ice crystals.

Most artificial snow is made using a Snow Cannon or Lance. The snowmaker uses high pressure water to blow tiny droplets into the air, which freezes as it falls to the ground.

What do they use for the fake stuff in movies? Most artificial snow allows for a quiet snowfall, without the cold, wet, and meltable natural counterpart. It is often concocted from substances such as foamite (a substance used in fire extinguishers), soap flakes, water, and sugar.

Over the years filmmakers have created it with marble dust, salt, and flour, and nowadays a much more environmentally friendly, paper-based cellulose product, is used.

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


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
